Hints & tips for racing effectiveness

Strokes: Going Somewhere

- Forward Stroke
- Reverse
- Draws Bow & Stern
- Cross Bow Draw
- Rudder
- Sit & Switch

Maneuvers: Getting From Point A to Point B

- Paddle in straight line for 100 yards
- Turn canoe in smooth manner and return to starting point
- Stop the canoe within two canoe lengths
- Paddle backwards straight 25 yards
- Demonstrate knowledge and ability to perform strokes to control the canoe
- Group Practice
- Switch from bow to stern and repeat maneuvers

Rescue and Safety

- Float plan use
- Review dressing for getting wet
- Rescue priorities people, canoe, gear/paddle
- Use of throw bags
- Safe exit upon capsize maintain contact with canoe and paddle
- Swim canoe to shore and empty
- Canoe over canoe rescue
- Assisted re-entry heel hook, slings, and other assistive devices
- Signal Techniques for Rescue
 - Stay with canoe and wave for assistance
 - Hand signals
 - Flag signals
 - Whistle signals
 - Flashlight signals
 - Flare signals
